When I look back on 2024, I see important milestones on our strategic plan journey. To help affiliates adapt in a changing world, we added more online resources, provided consultations, and hosted programs on succession planning and the Generational Transition Survey. And as we helped affiliates navigate transitions, we tended to our own, bidding fond farewells to Director of Programs Joanna Reiner Wilkinson and long-time Director of Development Robin Hayden.

We also made significant headway in our quest to achieve financial sustainability in the post-pandemic economy. Camp enrollment rebounded to pre-pandemic times, a new major donor relationship blossomed, and we saw encouraging growth in donations and bequests. We ended the year with an exciting surplus, which is now funding a strategic staff expansion, boosting our grants program, and establishing a new fund for ongoing operational support.

There are so many parallels between the work of stewarding living traditions and navigating change. How do we preserve the best of what

came before while creating space for what will come next? And how do we also stay grounded in the present—in the community, joy, and music happening right now? These questions are at the heart of all that we do, both as an individual organization and as we serve the broader community.

My hope is that CDSS will help dancers, musicians, and singers feel less alone when facing challenges in their communities. Whether someone is stepping into leadership, starting a new gathering, reinvigorating a beloved event, or passing the torch, I want CDSS to be there supporting them. I want us to be a repository for stories, histories, best practices, and new approaches, a conduit for connecting folks with information and people that can help them achieve their goals.

Thank you for supporting this crucial work and helping our extensive dance, music, and song community thrive!

# Camp Programs Building skills to take home

2024 was another successful year for CDSS camp programs! Total attendance across our nine weeks of camp increased again over last year, marking a sustained returned to pre-pandemic participation.

We ran five intensive courses at camp (for English and square dance callers, contra dance musicians, and singers), providing training and special instruction to 57 participants from 23 states and provinces.

And Cascade of Music & Dance (left) enjoyed an excellent first year at a new location, Camp Kweebec, near Schwenksville, PA. The staff at the camp facility were very welcoming and plan to make adjustments to food, beds, and more to further improve the camper experience.

# Across Our Community Helping launch, restart, and nurture events far and wide


In 2024, we awarded \$10,080 in community grant funding to 21 projects in 12 states and 2 provinces. 29% of these projects were brand new events, 14% were special events or series restarting post-pandemic, and a whopping 48% were trainings for dance musicians and callers.

### **2024 Grant Recipients**





## 2024 Financial Snapshot

2024 was another strong year for income. Camps remained our largest source of revenue, accounting for 47% of our annual income and highlighting just how essential they are to what we do. Donations and membership dues accounted for 39%, bolstered by generous bequests. And we saw modest year over year growth in our sales and services (8%) and investments (4%). Our 2024 total income increased by almost 8% over 2023.

We saw a continued downward trend in expenses, thanks to ongoing internal efforts to reduce operational costs. Camp expenses made up the largest share (57%). We also devoted resources to fundraising (13%) and administration (11%) to keep everything running smoothly. And money for sales and services (11%) and education and outreach (8%) made possible our insurance programs, grants, podcasts, publications, and free online resources, helping us support our affiliates and the community at large in meaningful and lasting ways.





### 2024 Expenses



#### 2020-2024 Income and Expense Comparison




The Bright Futures gift supplemented our annual income from 2020-2023, enabling us to launch online programming. The increased grants income in 2020, 2021, and 2023 represents special pandemic-related state and federal funding in these years.

This five-year overview reflects a story of resilience, innovation, and robust community investment in CDSS.

Although expenses rose dramatically after 2020, we adapted and worked fervently to regain a better balance. Our concerted efforts to reduce operational costs in 2023 and 2024 made a significant difference. Steady income growth over the past five years speaks to both the strength of our community support and our successful expansion of programming following the challenges of the pandemic. In 2024, board fundraising efforts and substantial bequests helped drive income to a five-year high, positioning us well for 2025.
