
history sites, Renaissance festivals, conventions, and for stage productions and nonprofit events around the world.

I try to imagine that. Fire guts her home so she gives herself to the grace of movement.


A dance partner. Assigned steps that lead through flames. One outstretched hand then the next.

though utterly unhurried, and now she faces her partner, follows the sequence of hands and smiles


and tries to keep moving through *Bring Me Flowers*, The Bare Necessities, then Banish Misfortune.

STEPPIN' UP TO THE MIC IN CALIFORNIA

In the heart of California's central coast, the historic town of San Luis Obispo has hosted a contra dance on the second Saturday of each month since 1986. Like so many contra dances, the dance series was suspended during the COVID-19 shutdown, but was able to start up again in September 2022. I resumed my duties as the only caller in the area, even though I had thought that my days as a caller were over.

In 2024, I recognized that indeed, my days as a caller were coming to an end. However, there was no one stepping up to fill my shoes. In response, I proposed to our Board of Directors a workshop series to teach others how to call for contra dancing. I felt that not only would this save my own dance, but would also bring new people into the pool of callers available in California, at a time when many dance organizations are experiencing difficulty finding good callers for their dances.

Thus, a new callers' workshop series, "Steppin' Up To The Mic", launched! The series of six workshops will be held throughout 2025 in San Luis Obispo, CA, and will feature such notable callers/teachers as Lisa Greenleaf (Boston), Jeff Spero (Los Angeles), Jacqui Grennan (San Pedro, CA), and Kelsey Hartman (Hayward, CA). The series has been generously awarded a grant from CDSS, and their support is very much appreciated. Details about the series are available at **cccds.org**.

Our organization, Central Coast Country Dance Society (CCCDS), is very excited to welcome new and aspiring callers to town. Each workshop will cover a different set of topics unique to the world of a caller, such as:

- Building a repertoire of dances
- · Working with the band
- Understanding the music
- Teaching the introductory lesson and walk-thrus
- Gendered and non-gendered calling
- Programming
- Building a base of solid teaching

CCCDS is especially excited that renowned caller Lisa Greenleaf will travel all the way from Boston to teach the final workshop December 12-13, in an expanded, three-part presentation.

As of February 19, we have nine wonderful new callers registered for our series! We held our first workshop on February 8 and thoroughly enjoyed greeting our enthusiastic attendees, who were receptive and ready to further their skills. Two of them felt ready to step up to the mic at our dance that evening, and they enjoyed a most enthusiastic response from our local dance community. They did a fantastic job! We look forward to hearing more from them, and eventually hiring them to call for our dance. I fully expect that many of the dances in California will follow suit.

For new and aspiring callers, having an opportunity to learn from such an amazing, knowledgeable, and diverse group of callers will be invaluable. And for the contra dance community in California, having a group of new, energetic, and enthusiastic callers will go a long way toward keeping our beloved tradition alive.

Look for our follow up article next year, after our series has concluded. And if you happen to be in the area, please come dance with us, and share in the growth and development of this fine group of new callers! Let the joy of learning and growing together begin!

A PLAYFUL PORPOISE

Longways duple minor

For Chris Levey, September 2023.

- At All dance into the center; turn single right.
 Star right halfway; turn single left and face partner.
- A2 Two changes of rights and lefts.

 Is right-hand turn I.5, moving down between the 2s. Is end crossed over, with original first corner dancers facing each other.
- BI Full dolphin hey (pass left shoulders to begin). Is end in top place (still crossed over).
- B2 Mirror back-to-back, is splitting the 2s to begin.
 Partners turn and progress: is turn halfway and cast, while 2s turn once round and lead up.

TEACHING NOTES:

In the dolphin hey (BI), the 1st couple dances in tandem, changing leads at each end.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Chris submitted this dance and tune to the *News* prior to his passing last fall. Chris was, in his words, "tickled pink" to have these pieces written in his honor, and we are likewise honored to share them on his behalf. Chris was a former board member and lifetime supporter of CDSS and, as Sally Eshleman says in her introduction to this dance, instrumental in spreading community dance in the Upper Valley (VT/NH). "This dance is a gift to Chris Levey, who introduced English country dance to the Upper Valley many decades ago, and as dancer and caller has shared his love of its beauty and grace ever since. Scott Higgs wrote the dance and Carol Compton composed the tune. This is for you, Chris, who gave us such wonderful gifts of music, dance, and yourself."

—Sally's presentation at the Norwich Mini-Ball, September 23, 2023 Commissioning a dance and tune for Chris was my idea, though once it was shared with the dance community, it became a wonderful group venture. Scott asked what sort of dance we envisioned: what figures, what feeling? Chris was a devoted swimmer and a lively and humorous presence. A dance evoking water was suggested, with a dolphin hey included. Scott named it A Playful Porpoise. Carol composed a spritely tune, "Hey Nonny Nano," whose title alludes to both Shakespeare's refrain, "Hey Nonny Nonny" in *As You Like It*, and to Chris's professional involvement with nanotechnology.

The occasion for the commission was the first Norwich Mini-Ball, planned by the same committee that for 25 years had arranged the Strafford Ball in Strafford, VT, two enjoyable days of dancing, eating, and hiking. After a respite of three years due to COVID, dancing was coming back once again. So, guided by a dancer survey, the committee planned a masked half-day mini-ball in Norwich, VT. Some

dancers dressed to the nines, others were casual. The calling by Chris and David Millstone was excellent, and the music by the group Triptych, comprising Thal Aylward, Kate Barnes, and Carol Compton, was outstanding. It was an exciting time to pay tribute to Chris, who stood astonished on the dance floor with his wife, Barbara DeFelice. After whoops and applause, we all began to dance.

Celebrating Chuck Ward's Musical Legacy

At the 2009 Lifetime Contribution Award celebration for Chuck Ward, Sharon Green said that one of Chuck's greatest talents was his ability to "transform printed notes into cascades of infectious vitality and great beauty." That very ethos lives on through CDSS's Chuck Ward Musicians Training Fund.

The Ward Fund was established in 2007 in collaboration with the Bay Area Country Dance Society (BACDS) to celebrate Chuck and his impact on English country dance music across the US. Known for his playfulness, puns, and love of tricks, Chuck was an accomplished pianist, accordionist, and organist. He played in dance halls from coast to coast and founded the English Country Dance Society of San Francisco (now BACDS).

Chuck left a lasting impact on the Bay Area dance community, so it is only fitting that these generous funds be used to strengthen the local musicians he so deeply influenced.

Why Local Musician Training Matters

As someone fortunate enough to travel and experience many incredible dance communities, I've seen firsthand that local musicians, callers, and organizers form the nucleus of any thriving dance scene. Investing in local musicianship does more than just improve the quality of music at dances—it strengthens the relationship between dancers and musicians, deepens their engagement, and builds a sense of community that keeps the tradition alive and flourishing. I challenge anyone to find a reason not to support local musician growth!

Bringing the Ward Fund to Fall Frolick

With that in mind, last fall, I saw the perfect opportunity to integrate musician training into Fall Frolick, BACDS's annual English country dance weekend. We also wanted to introduce local musicians to fresh perspectives by bringing in instructors from outside the area.

Karen Axelrod (piano) and Ben Schreiber (fiddle) were obvious choices (in my humble opinion). After working with them at Dance, Music & Spice last year (shameless plug: registration is open, and they'll be back on staff this summer!), I was inspired by their musicality, fresh ideas, and obvious love of the music and community. I was thrilled to be able to bring them to the West Coast to share their expertise with the community. (Karen was already well-known and beloved in the Bay Area, and Ben—who previously lived in the Bay—is also cherished, though he is primarily recognized as a contra dance musician—something I hope has changed!)

The Workshops

To maximize accessibility, we structured the training across two settings:

- A Thursday night workshop before the weekend, open to all musicians.
- Dedicated musicians' training sessions during the Fall Frolick weekend

Thursday Workshop

The Thursday workshop took place before the regular English country dance evening in Berkeley. Musicians had a chance to learn, rehearse, and then immediately apply their skills in a live dance setting. Karen and Ben created a hands-on curriculum, preparing the six tunes for the night's dance that the caller, the amazing Brad Foster, sent in advance. These tunes became the vehicle for introducing core concepts in playing for ECD including:

- How to make your playing danceable
- Effective beginnings and endings for ECD tunes
- Arranging music creatively
- How to play in an ensemble
- What to do when you're not playing the melody



Karen joked that, "Normally, it would take 8,723 days to cover all this information. But we will fit it all into two hours." And somehow, they did.

The night was truly special. Brad Foster led the dances, and the energy in the room was alive, with a large, enthusiastic group of musicians playing for equally enthusiastic dancers. Both local dancers and visitors in town for the weekend came together in a joyful celebration of music and movement.

Fall Frolick Workshops

At Fall Frolick itself, Karen and Ben continued their training with two dedicated one-hour workshops for musicians. These sessions built on the Thursday night experience, offering more in-depth coaching on interpretation, two note introductions, phrasing, and ensemble dynamics. (Did you know one of the most effective arrangements is to not play sometimes?!)

The feedback was overwhelmingly positive. One participant remarked, "Loved this—so helpful to learn new ways of playing for ECD!"

Making It Possible: The Impact of the Ward Fund

Fall Frolick operates on a tight budget, and without the support of CDSS and the Chuck Ward Musicians Training Fund, we simply would not have been able to bring Karen and Ben for this invaluable weekend of learning and inspiration. Their presence as both teachers and musicians, along with the other incredible staff, elevated the entire weekend, creating magical moments of music and dance that our community will carry forward.

Grants from the Ward Fund are available on an ongoing basis; I encourage you to consider how this resource can serve your own community! Investing in local musicians is investing in the future of dance, and we are deeply grateful to CDSS for the funds to make this possible.

Audrey Jaber is the Membership Coordinator at CDSS, which definitely did not bias her in writing this article. She tours widely, playing fiddle for both English and contra dances, with the Free Raisins, Wake Up Robin, and many other musicians.








