All three of the above will take place in Chicago on the weekend of May 21-23. The Chicago Country Dancers will be our kind hosts. The meetings will be on Sunday, with the leaders' conference from Friday through Sunday morning.

All CDSS members are invited, even to the Council meeting, although there you have no voice unless you are a Council member. For information, write or call CDSS. Some travel money is available.

#### Pinewoods Previews

Since we last spoke with you about Pinewoods, all six weeks and the Boston Center/CDSS Campers' Week have acquired chairmen, and all the chairmen have been working away at their programs. There may of course be changes, but it's possible to tell already that there's a lot of good news. Here it is.

EARLY MUSIC WEEK (July 17-24). Chairman, MARSHALL BARRON. If you love English dancing you probably love Marshall too, for her artful violin is heard on three of our CDSS dance recordings. She is also well known for her stimulating dance band workshops. Long involved with early music, Marshall plays the rebec regularly with the Tuesday Consort and has taken part in several Early Music Weeks at Pinewoods.

As in previous years, there will be instrumental and vocal classes taught by skilled, supportive and inspiring teachers; English country dancing for all, led by one of CDSS's finest dance teachers, SUE SALMONS; and classes in beginning viols, early strings, krumhorns, pipe and tabor, recorder consorts, trio sonatas, and ornamentation.

A new direction this year will be toward the skills needed in playing for dancing, whether court dancing or country dancing: how to give variety to the melody through instrumentation, ornamentation, improvisation, or percussion, while retaining the vitality and rhythmic quality of the dance. There will be two dance band classes each day, one open to all instrumentalists, the other for advanced players only and including the opportunity to join staff musicians in playing for actual dancing.

Also new will be a class in percussion, open to all. Campers are invited to bring anything that tinkles or bangs, to experiment with producing sounds of different colors and learning to judge when and where it is appropriate and exciting to use them.

Finally, there will be a special treat for lutanists and classical guitarists who read mu-

sic and who may play in folk or dance groups, but have had little chance to play in classical music ensembles. They will play in mixed consort, using all their training as they work on such problems as how to realize a figured bass or serve as continuo in Baroque sonatas.

Staff will include many from last summer: GRACE FELDMAN and BICI PETTIT, viols; ELLOYD HANSON, JOHANNA KULBACH, recorders; PHOEBE LARKEY, recorders and krumhorns; BRIAN McGOVERN, chorus and voice; and SUE SALMONS, country dance, accompanied by BARBARA ROTH, piano.

New and welcome this summer will be STANLEY CHARKEY, teacher of composition and music theory and member of the New York Renaissance Band (lute and figured bass realization); GENE MURROW, member of the New York Renaissance Band and New York Baroque Ensemble (recorders, pipe & tabor, consorts); and JAY ROSENBERG, assistant director of Quadrivium, specialist in Sephardic folk music and member of several early music groups (percussion).

AMERICAN DANCE AND MUSIC WEEK (July 24-31) will again be chaired by Paul Brown, traditional ban-jo player and singer, and will bring together musicians, callers, singers and storytellers from New Mexico, western North Carolina, and the Northeast for a varied and exciting program.

Returning from last year will be TOD WHITTE-MORE of Watertown, MA, whose impressively energetic and competent calling of New England contras and squares has been attracting more and more dancers around the country. Tod will be accompanied again by RODNEY MILLER, well-known and respected fiddler from New Hampshire, and also by ANDY DAVIS, a fine piano and accordion player and previous staff member whose repertoire ranges from jazz to old time. A singer, older traditional musician or storyteller from New England is still being sought.

From the South, BENTON and LARRY FLIPPEN, PAUL SUTPHIN and PAUL BROWN will again provide a

real old-time North Carolina string band. FRED ARMSTRONG-PARK will call square and round dancing; lead workshops in harmonica, storytelling, and traditional southern percussion instruments such as spoons, scrubboard and fiddle sticks; and venture with other staff members into blues and bluegrass. JENNY ARMSTRONG-PARK will play fiddle and lead singing with her vast repertoire of tunes and songs. ALICE GERRARD, well-known performer and writer of songs, long involved in old-time and country music, will lead a songwriters' workshop and participate in numbers of special events, from workshops on the tunes of Old Galax, with Paul Brown, to bluegrass and old-time songs with Paul Sutphin, Paul Brown and Fred Armstrong-Park.

THE FIDDLE PUPPETS, all four former members of the Green Grass Cloggers, will be at Pinewoods for the first time. This dynamic, funloving and skilled group of modern Southern style cloggers, nationally known through their appearances at major festivals and conventions, will be helping workshop participants to create their own styles, as well as leading square and round dancing.

Traditional western square dancing has been part of American Dance and Music Week more than once in the past. This year, Pinewoods will welcome PAM McKEEVER of Albuquerque, New Mexico, to lead these dances and others from the Southwest which have received less exposure at camp. Pam, a member of the Lloyd Shaw Foundation and past coach and caller for the Wagon Wheels Exhibition Square Dance Team, will give classes in exhibition (including aerial) square dancing and in choreographed and freestyle traditional couple dancing. Also planned is a least one presentation on creating modified dances for special groups such as the elderly and handicapped.

Besides all this, there will be callers' workshops and band workshops from north and south, classes in fiddle, banjo, guitar, piano and percussion; the chance to sing, to hear and tell stories; and maybe even a little jazz.

FOLK MUSIC WEEK (July 31-August 7) will be cochaired by that incomparable folk singer and concertina player LOUIS KILLEN, and his wife, MARGARET OSIKA, returning, to our delight, for a second year.

The week will be a special joy for folksingers, because it will give great importance to helping them to develop their singing skills, widen their song repertoire, and increase their accompanying ability, at the same time giving them a greater knowledge of the tradition in which they are singing. Famous singer and vocal coach ETHEL RAIM of the Penny Whistlers will be on hand to help singers realize their vocal potential, using the techniques especially associated with Balkan singing but applicable to singers universally.

Louis himself will of course contribute his famous chanteys and songs, offering a special class on aspects of British Isles traditional music and lore. Other treats will include ART THIEME, with his vast repertoire of midwestern songs, folklore, and jokes, and his proficiency on guitar, banjo, jawsharp, musical saw, and even humanatone. Art is a wonderful person to have around, and campers will love his reper-

toire. JERRY EPSTEIN of New York, full of traditional lore and musicianship, will be teaching both musical theory, and traditional singing styles. CATHY FINK, who needs no introduction to anybody who loves the banjo, will do workshops on that instrument and seminars on the development of country music.

As ever at Pinewoods, the dancing will be great too, for that universal folkperson JIM MORRISON will be calling the dances, as well as doing workshops in fiddle and autoharp. The dancers will move to the infectious music of RODNEY MILLER, superb New England fiddler, and ANDY DAVIS, accordion and piano. Both Roddy and Andy will also do workshops, Roddy in New England fiddling, Andy in folk music techniques on piano accordion and piano.

Some other delights are planned, but can't yet be announced. Keep watching.

FAMILY WEEK (August 7-14) will be chaired again this year by JIM and MARNEY MORRISON, whose week last year engendered such enthusiasm. Jim will do mountain squares and jolly flatfoot dancing. Kids' music and dancing will be led by PETER and MARY AMIDON of Brattleboro, VT and ANN LEACH, piano and accordion player who has been on the staff of Berea and Brasstown. SANDY BRADLEY of Seattle will call squares and hold a callers' workshop; FRED BREUNIG of Vermont and BRAD FOS-TER of San Francisco will teach country dance. Morris dance will be taught by ALISTAIR BROWN, a Scot who is now squire of Forest City Morris in London, Ontario, and by TUBBY REYNOLDS, a most welcome visitor from England. He's a specialist in Cotswold Morris and a splendid traditional dance caller, besides playing pipe and tabor, fiddle, and concertina.

TINA LIDEN-JONES of Blacksburg, VA (former lead singer with Trapezoid) will lead general singing and workshops on how to sing better.

Musicians will include fiddler STEVE HICKMAN, pianist and accordionist LAURIE ANDRES, and button accordionist JOHN ROWLANDS. Finally, identical twins GREG and JERE CANOTE (fiddle and guitar respectively), also known as the Small Wonder String Band, will play for dances and entertain by playing and singing in what they term their genetically matched harmonies.

With this staff, it promises to be a stimulating and highly amusing week for all ages.

ENGLISH WEEK (August 14-21) will be chaired by CDSS master teacher GENNY SHIMER, former director of the Society, eagerly sought after as chairman of dance leaders' conferences, and long associated with the dance weeks at John C. Campbell Folk School in Brasstown, NC.

Genny has planned an exciting week in which dancers can participate in a great variety of choices: Country dance with classes in basic skills; repertoire (largely 17th and 18th century); and community and traditional dances.

Country and Court dances of the Renaissance and Elizabethan Age: English minuet; country dances in Baroque style; and an experimental workshop in early 19th century waltzes. Morris and Sword dance traditions: classes in Cotswold Morris;

Northwest (clog) Morris; Long Sword (Handsworth); Rapper Sword (beginning and experienced). Solo clog will be taught for both beginning and experienced dancers. Traditional dance will in-

The executive committee has regrouped due to the past president moving out of state. A great deal of new interest has been kindled and a new publicity program started. We offer lots of good live music, loyal patrons of our dances and wholesome atmosphere. Three of our leaders are musicians in dance bands with extensive backgrounds in Scottish, English, New England, and many other types of music. Ralph Sweet is a well known caller with a large following and also makes recorders. Jim Gregory teaches dance professionally and is a good caller. He had a very successful biweekly dance series last summer in cooperation with CDIC and the Hartford Parks Department.

CDIC published American Country Dances of the Revolutionary Era, the record accompanying the Keller-Sweet book. We are at present preparing two collections of dances for publication, and members of CDIC are conducting research into various phases of dance and song history, including 17th-century English and early American and contemporary composition, as well as collecting traditional material.

We received statewide publicity through a full-page write-up in the Arts Resources' exhibit tabloid, "Three Centuries of Connecticut Folk Art." The exhibit is being shown through the winter in many locations throughout the state and has stimulated many inquiries.

The Washington Folk Festival's theme is "Bringing Washington its Own Music." All musicians, dancers and craftspeople (some 400-450 each year) are from the Washington area. This type of festival, celebrating the folk culture of a particular locality, could be attempted by other localities. It is done on a shoestring budget (about \$2,000, all donated by local businesses and others), and run entirely by volunteers. It is free to the public and therefore exposes tremendous numbers of people to folk music and dance every year. Other staff members will include two special quests from England: TUBBY REYNOLDS, leader of the Bath City Morris, outstanding morris dancer and teacher, fine fiddle and pipe and tabor player. He will teach and play for morris and lead community dancing. BOB PARKER of EFDSS is a specialist in working with dance leaders and coaching groups; he will hold a workshop for leaders on preparing performances and will teach country dance basics, and rapper sword.
