DIRECTOR'S COLUMN

In this issue my column contains three sections: a State of the Society Report, comprising information from the Director's Reports given this summer to the National Council, Annual General Membership, and September Executive Committee meetings; a separate Pinewoods Report; plus a section of statistics related to the two reports.

STATE OF THE SOCIETY REPORT

MEMBERSHIP: As you can see from the figures on the statistics page, membership in the Society has shown little change over the last three years. The current (September 1983) count of 1657 is far below the actual number of people who actively participate in country "nce and music events in the U.S. and Canada. We ed to find new ways to appeal to and be of service to these non-member participants in order to raise the membership above its current plateau. One measure of the success of the Society is how well we can accomplish this goal. Any suggestions you have would be greatly appreciated; some of our plans are mentioned below.

Centers & Associates: The number of member groups has risen dramatically this past year; the 12 new (and one dropped) groups bring our total, including the New York Dance Activities Committee (NYDAC) and the New York Pinewoods Folk Music Club (NYPFMC) (which are neither Centers nor Associates) to 65. This is an impressive gain - a growth of 20% in one year: however, as with individual membership, there are still many more unaffiliated groups with similar purposes than affiliated ones. The Society needs to improve both its image and its group services if this growth rate is to continue. We are looking into the possibility of offering group liability insurance coverage; it should be possible, although the cost is unknown, but we have not yet been able to find a company to offer it. A list of the services we offer Centers and Associates will be contained in a later issue of the News.

ANCIAL REPORT: A copy of part of the last fiscal year balance sheet, prepared by now-retired Treasurer John Hodgkin, is contained elsewhere in this issue. It shows a small net balance ("excess of receipts over disbursements") of \$3174, most of which is earmarked for the last year's issue of the magazine which is now scheduled to appear in November. We have thus successfully met all of our expenses as well as being reasonably within budget projections.

Next year's budget is however as yet slightly unbalanced, due to a variety of increased expenses. The largest of these is the office rent increase. Our current five-year lease will be up at the end of March, 1984, and the new lease brings with it an 89% There have been discussions on the increase. possibility of moving the office; no decision has been made at this time. It appears however that our rent is going from very low to reasonable, and that it would be difficult to find a similar place at lower cost within the greater New York metropolitan area. We will keep you informed on the status of the office (and the budget) in subsequent issues of the News.

Pinewoods is our one truly national PINEWOODS: program; it serves us well as a national focal point, drawing members from all over the U.S. and Canada as well as being an excellent membership incentive. A report on this year's camp is contained elsewhere in this issue.

WEEKENDS: The two standard dance weekends are planned as usual for fall and spring at Hudson Guild Farm. Both Early Music and Early Dance & Music Weekend programs have been dropped due to insufficient attendance. The decision on Early Music Weekend will be reviewed again before next year's season; if enough interest is shown this program may return, although at a higher camper fee than the other weekends to offset the typically smaller enrollment. Early Dance & Music has been dropped as a residential program, with the intent to continue it on a smaller, less-frequent and non-residential basis. No plans have been made yet on such a program. A new event - our first American Dance & Music Weekend - is scheduled this year for February 24-26, with both of our most recent authors - Ted Sannella and Bob Dalsemer - as staff.

The high camper fees, due primarily to high room and board costs, are a worry; we are looking either for ways to cut expenses or for a new, less expensive facility. A Family Weekend has been proposed; lack of a sufficiently inexpensive facility has prevented its inception so far.

^{**}RAFFLE: We have not yet sold enough raffle tickets to cover their estimated expense of printing plus camper fees, and therefore have not included either its income or expense.

POSTSCRIPT: CDSS is doing well, with a successful mix of programs and services that, so far at least, pay for themselves through direct fees, membership dues, and donations. There is also however great potential waiting to be tapped, both in terms of new individual and group members and also in the talents and skills we could be sharing. Better communications are the key to the latter (as well as perhaps a means of achieving the former). We intend to keep you informed on the health and inner workings of the Society in future issues of the News, as well as bringing articles of specific concrete value (such as a series on PA equipment being prepared by Walter Lenk of Cambridge, MA). The Society's greatest strength is as a network of people; we need your assistance to realize this strength. Your comments, criticism, suggestions, and questions, along with news of local dance and song activities, are always welcome - and are necessary to help us reach our growth and service potential.

PINEWOODS '83 REPORT

ATTENDANCE: Total attendance at Pinewoods was 726 campers, or an average of approximately 104 per week. Overall this shows little change in the last four seasons; attendance at the individual weeks was however quite varied.

EARLY MUSIC (EM) had a very large increase - up 26 from the previous year - and with no space available in the viola da gamba classes. It was a very positive, high-energy week, showing excellent potential for continued growth in future years.

The next three weeks, however, were all down slightly from last year's count. AMERICAN DANCE & MUSIC (ADM) and FOLK MUSIC (FM) weeks continued a pattern of the previous year, with ADM having a high last minute cancellation rate while FM grew. ADM started out with a women's waiting list (Due not to the week being full but to the imbalance being greater than we accept); by the time the week began this waiting list was gone. FM started this season with very low registrations; its sudden last minute rise brought it back up to normal. Like EM, FM was a very positive and high-energy week and showed great promise for the future.

FAMILY WEEK (FAM), like ADM, also had a waiting list prior to camp (Due in this case to excess enrollment). Unfortunately, by the time cancellations occurred, most of the families on the waiting list had made other plans. Virtually no one was available off of the waiting list in the six weeks prior to camp. Also, due to the difficulty of housing the various age groups, the FAM registration process is generally slower than the rest, thus adding to the problem. We are working on ways to speed up the registration/housing process to minimize this problem in the future.

ENGLISH DANCE (ED) and ENGLISH & AMERICAN DANCE (EAD) weeks were both, as usual, full, with waiting lists respectively of 14 (all women) and 35 (9 couples, 6 men, 11 women). CAPPERS' WEEK (CAM), like FAM, initially had a waiting list; by the time the week opened it was just slightly less than full.

CDSS AT PINEWHOODS - C# FUNDRAISHING AND CONSTRUCTION:


The CDSS at Pinewoods C# Renovation Fund has raised to date (9/30/83) \$20,885 (a breakdown of this figure appears elsewhere in this issue.) Our goal is to raise \$50,000 by the end of camp next summer; the balance of \$29,115 needed could be raised if every member gave an additional \$17.57! The fundraisin drive will continue throughout the year, highlighted by the raffle of one place at each of CDSS' 7 Pinewoods weeks next summer. Tickets are available from the office at 1 for \$5 or 5 for \$20; your choice of week (one week per ticket) must be specified when the tickets are purchased. The drawings (one for each week) will be held in April. In addition, the sale of the special fundraising items that were available at Pinewoods this summer will continue from the office (see Sales column elsewhere in this issue). Gifts, donations, pledges, and benefit events are always welcome; please help us reach this goal!

Pinewoods Camp Inc. (PCI) has been hard at work on plans for the renovation project. Several changes in plans have occurred because of suggestions by campers at the various Pinewoods programs throughout the summer. Most important of these was the request to remove the posts, this project, due to cost, construction, space, and maintenance considerations, resulted in the design of a new truss roof to replace the old roof entirely. In addition, the band shell will be moved back, away from the dance floor, and two new entrances added to the front. All of this will result in greatly expanded usable floor space. A construction bid has been accepted; the project will start soon and should be well along by the time thi issue reaches you.


